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1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Manor Estates Group¹ (referred to throughout this Policy as ‘the Group’) is committed to supporting, promoting and safeguarding the welfare of children and adults at risk of harm. Being able to protect children and adults at risk of harm requires that staff are equipped to recognise when to be concerned and understand when and how to share these concerns with appropriate agencies who are in a position to investigate such concerns.
- 1.2 This Policy is supported by procedures for staff on responding to suspicions, concerns or confirmed information relating to the safety and wellbeing of a child or adult at risk of harm.

2. Aims of Policy

- 2.1 The aim of this Policy is to ensure that situations where children or adults who are either at risk of or experiencing harm are referred to appropriate agencies who are able to investigate and address concerns.

3. Policy

Adult Protection

- 3.1 For the purposes of this Policy, ‘adult’ refers to any person aged 16 years or over.
- 3.2 The Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 defines ‘Adults at risk’ as those who:

- a) Are unable to safeguard their own wellbeing, property, rights or other interest;
- b) Are at risk of harm; and
- c) Because they are affected by disability, mental disorder, illness or physical or mental infirmity, are more vulnerable to being harmed than adults who are not so affected.

An adult is considered to be at risk of harm if:

- d) Another person's conduct is causing (or is likely to cause) the adult to be harmed; or
- e) The adult is engaging (or is likely to engage) in conduct which causes (or is likely to cause) self-harm.

In order to comply with the Act, all three conditions (a to c above) must be met. In addition at least one condition of the risk of harm (d or e) must also be met.

3.3 The Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 defines 'harm' as:

- Physical harm (includes slapping, punching, biting, hitting, shaking, kicking);
- Sexual harm (includes any sexual activity that a person doesn't feel comfortable with);
- Psychological harm (includes being humiliated, intimidated, shouted at, threatened, bullied);
- Financial harm (includes feeling under pressure to hand over money or possessions, it can involve exploitation of property or welfare benefits, or stopping someone getting their money or possessions, cheating or fraud);
- Neglect (including denying someone medication, medical or physical care, access to a doctor or other services, denying someone food, heating, privacy or dignity);
- Harm through self-neglect, omission or conduct that causes self-harm; or
- Harm through discrimination.

Harm may be caused by:

- Relative or friend;
- Formal or informal carer;
- A neighbour, member of the public or stranger;
- A member of staff / management;

- A volunteer; or
- Another service user.

Protection

- 3.4 The Group will co-operate with all relevant statutory and voluntary agencies to ensure that all reasonable steps are taken to protect adults at risk of harm.
- 3.5 Concerns about the well-being of vulnerable adults will be referred to appropriate statutory agencies. Section 4 of the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 place a duty on the local authority to make enquiries about a person's wellbeing, property or financial affairs if it knows or believes:
- a) That the person is an adult at risk; and
 - b) That it might need to intervene in order to protect that person's wellbeing, property of financial affairs.

Confidentiality

- 3.6 In most circumstances, adults have the right to make their own decisions about how they live even if, at times, they may appear to make poor choices.
- 3.7 The Group's Privacy Policy confirms that a Fair Processing Notice (FPN) will be issued to all tenants and other customers. The FPN outlines the personal data that will be held and the purposes for which that information will be used, including circumstances when the data may be shared and with whom. Where there is a requirement to process personal data not covered by the FPN, we are required to seek consent from the individual(s) concerned.
- 3.8 There may be times when it is not possible to obtain consent or even relevant to do so. In these situations we can still share information with relevant authorities if this is required to protect the vital interests of the data subject or someone else. Circumstances in which data could be shared are:
- An issue of public safety or public health;
 - An imminent threat to the adult;
 - A crime has been committed;
 - It appears that a person has been unduly pressurised;
 - The person is unable to understand choice and their consequences/level of capacity; or
 - The person potential causing harm is a service provider.

Child Protection

- 3.9 For the purposes of this Policy, a child is someone under the age of 18. While the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act can be applied to anyone over 16, the young person's circumstances will be used to determine how best the matter should be dealt with.
- 3.10 Someone may abuse or neglect a child by inflicting, or failing to act to prevent, significant harm to a child and may include:
- Physical abuse: causing physical harm by hitting, shaking, throwing, poisoning, burning, scalding, punching a child.
 - Emotional abuse: persistent emotional neglect or ill treatment that has severe and persistent adverse effects on a child's emotional development. It may involve:
 - conveying to a child that they are worthless or unloved, inadequate or valued only inasmuch as they meet the needs of another person;
 - the imposition of age, or developmentally, inappropriate expectations on a child; or
 - casing children to feel frightened or in danger of exploiting children.
 - Sexual abuse: **any** act that involves a child in any activity for the sexual gratification of another person. Sexual abuse involves forcing or enticing a child to take part in sexual activities, whether or not the child is aware of what is happening. Female genital mutilation (FGM) is recognised as child abuse and if it is considered that a child has or is likely to suffer from this, it should be considered in the context of child protection procedures.
 - Neglect: the persistent failure to meet a child's basic physical and/or psychological needs, likely to result in the serious impairment of the child's health or development. It may involve the parent/carer failing to provide adequate food, shelter and clothing, to protect a child from physical harm or danger, or to ensure appropriate medical care or treatment. It may also include neglect of the child's emotional needs.
- 3.11 Staff should also be alert to the potential impact on children of living with domestic violence or where there is problematic alcohol or substance misuse (including prescription as well as illegal drugs).

Action

- 3.12 Where **any** member of staff is concerned that harm has taken place, is taking place or is at risk of harm, the matter should be referred to the Senior Housing Officer or Housing Management

Director immediately or as soon as is practically possible. Where appropriate they will direct the member of staff to refer the matter to the relevant agencies.

- 3.13 Detailed information regarding the referral process are included in the procedures associated with this Policy.

4 Human Rights

- 4.1 Article 8 of the Human Rights Act 1998 is the right to respect for private life, family life and the home. This is a qualified right which means that we cannot interfere with it unless we are acting:

*“in the interests of national security, public safety or the economic wellbeing of the country, **for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others**”.*

It is clear that the circumstances in which we would take actions that might otherwise be considered in breach of Article 8 would be justifiable for the reasons highlighted in bold above.

5. Reporting

- 5.1 The Senior Housing Officer will prepare an annual report to the Housing Management Director outlining:
- Number of referrals made in respect of adults;
 - Which agencies cases were referred to;
 - Outcome (if known);

 - Number of referrals made in respect of children;
 - Which agencies cases were referred to;
 - Outcome (if known).

 - Summary of any concerns about the procedure for referral, the response of agencies or any other relevant issues.
